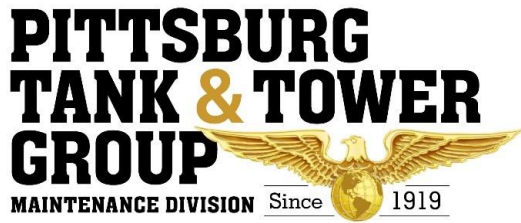

Section 1. The Board has determined and does hereby find, declare and determine:

(a) The District desires to finance the cost of various improvements to the District's water system consisting of the installation of new water mains and appurtenances to serve residents within the Kittrell Township of Vance County with public water (the "Project").

(b) The District is considering issuing revenue bonds to finance, together with other available funds, the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping the Project.

(c) The Project is necessary to secure adequate and reliable water service and to promote the present and future welfare of the residents of the District and its environs.

(d) The Board wishes to commence procedures for the issuance of revenue bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$1,672,000 at this time for the purpose of providing funds, together with any other available funds, to (i) pay the costs of the Project and (ii) pay certain other costs associated with the issuance of such revenue bonds.

(e) The amount of the proposed revenue bonds will be sufficient, but not excessive, for the purpose of paying the costs associated with the Project.

(f) The proposed Project is feasible.

(g) The annual audits of the District show the District to be in strict compliance with debt management polices, and the budgetary and fiscal management polices of the District are in compliance with the law.

(h) The United States Department of Agriculture has issued a commitment to purchase the proposed revenue bonds when issued, therefore the revenue bonds can be marketed at a reasonable interest cost to the District.

(i) The projected rate increases, if any, for water service in connection with the issuance of the proposed revenue bonds will be reasonable.

(j) The District intends to issue revenue bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the proposed revenue bonds.

Section 2. The Chair or Vice Chair of the Board, the Finance Officer and the Clerk to the Board or any deputy or assistant Clerk to the Board for the District are hereby authorized and directed to file an application with the Local Government Commission for approval of the issuance of revenue bonds and revenue bond anticipation notes for the purpose of providing funds, together with any other available funds, to (a) pay the costs of the Project and (b) pay certain other costs associated with the issuance of such bonds and notes.

Section 3. The Local Government Commission is requested to sell the proposed revenue bonds or revenue bond anticipation notes at a private sale without advertisement.

Section 4. The Chair or Vice Chair of the Board, the Finance Officer and the Clerk to the Board or any deputy or assistant Clerk to the Board for the District are hereby authorized and directed to take such action as such officers shall believe necessary and appropriate to assist the Local Government Commission in arranging for the procurement of revenue bond anticipation note financing with respect to the Project.

Section 5. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

Vance County Water Committee Report August 5, 2024

Water Committee Report

Phase 1B. The water committee (Brummitt, Feimster & Hester) met Wednesday, July 17, 2024 and the county manager provided an update to the committee as it relates to the funding application for the Phase 1B expansion. In early spring 2024, the county water district wanted to proceed with a revenue bond anticipation note financing for the improvement project, but at the time the county had not completed and filed its audit for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023. The FY23 audit is complete, and we can now go to the LGC for consideration and approval in September 2024. We will finance \$1,672,000 of the \$10,378,200 project cost through a bond to be purchased by USDA. The balance of the cost will be paid from USDA grants and State grants for the project from the General Assembly or District contributed funds. Bids for the project are in hand and the contractor has told the District it is willing to hold the bids open through September, but not past then. *For your information.*

Availability Fee. There have been several customer requests for forgiveness of availability fees, as well as a request to grant customers the opportunity to be released from their contracts. The committee agreed that is not the direction that they would like to go at this time. *For your information.*

Envirolink. By their own admission, there have been areas in which Envirolink has not performed well. Moving forward, there will be increased communication between county staff and Envirolink staff. *For your information.*

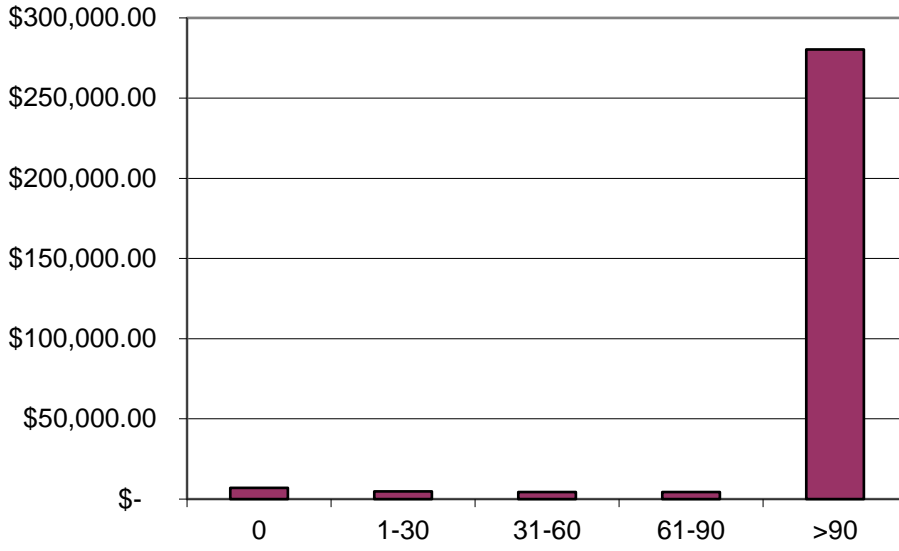

Availability Aging Report for VANCE COUNTY



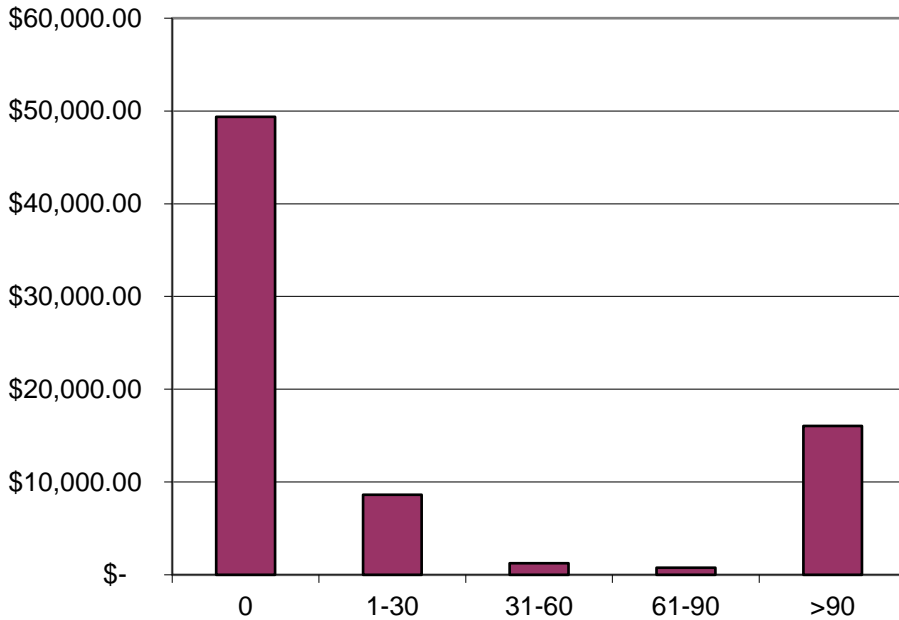

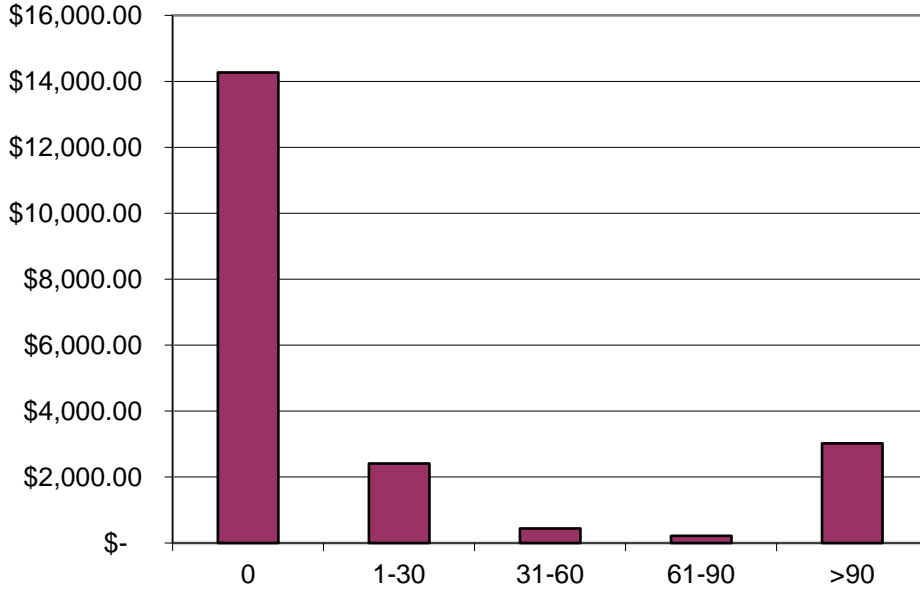

Budget and Finance Director's Report for the Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024

The attached is a preliminary year-end financial report on where Vance County stands on the revenues received and expenditures paid for FY 23-24 as of July 31, 2024. Please be advised that there still may be prior year expenditures and prior year receivables that have not been received and therefore not yet recorded.

○ **Revenues**

- We have received \$54,419,789.52 of the Amended Revenue Budget of \$58,767,016.
- This represents a shortfall of \$4,347,226.48. Breakdown listed below:
 - Received \$2,303,590 less in DSS Revenue - (*This is directly attributed to the staffing levels.*)
 - Received \$1,192,427 less in Sales Tax Revenue
 - Received \$460,623 less in Ambulance Revenue
 - Received \$158,767 less from City of Henderson
 - Other departments that contributed to the reduction are Animal Control, Planning, Register of Deeds, Jail and other State Revenues.
- Overall, we have collected 93% of the Amended Revenue Budget.

○ **Expenses**

- We have spent \$49,491,475.51 of the Amended Expenditure Budget amount of \$58,767,016.
- The total above equate to 84% of the Amended Expenditure Budget being spent.
- Overall, the revenue received for FY 23-24 is \$4,928,314 over the amount of expenditures.

○ **External Audit:**

- The External Audit for Fiscal Year 23-24 has begun.
- The representatives will be here in person on August 14th and 15th and again on September 16th and 17th.

- You should have received a questionnaire from Thompson, Price, Scott, Adams and Co to complete.
- This same questionnaire has also been sent to the County Manager and all Department Heads for completion.
- Departments and outside agencies have been notified of the information needed to facilitate an efficient and timely completion of the external audit.
- The County Manager will also be kept abreast of the status of the External Audit.
- A weekly follow-up of outstanding information will be conducted by myself and the Assistant Finance Director, Tammy Martin.

Opioid Committee

The opioid committee (Alston, Faines, & Feimster); Brummitt attending, met Tuesday, July 23, 2024 and the county manager provided an update to the committee as it relates to the current opioid fund balance and current status of opioid funds. The consensus of the committee is to have another meeting that includes the opioid committee/BoCC and those that the county manager deems necessary to begin planning for the use of the opioid funds. This meeting will be scheduled in late September, early October. The county manager also plans to hold the annual meeting as required per the MOA. *For your information.*

Human Resources Committee

The human resources committee (Faines, Feimster & Taylor); Brummitt attending, met Tuesday, July 23, 2024 to discuss implementation of a critical pay and on call policy. The consensus of the committee is for refinement of the policy as well as budgetary impact before discussing further. Staff plans to meet towards the end of August to discuss. *For your information.*

Properties Committee

REO Properties. The properties committee (Alston, Brummitt & Taylor) met Thursday, July 25, 2024 to review a request from the City of Henderson to purchase three jointly owned real estate owned (REO) properties as they have done in the past. The properties are as follows: Daniel Street - PIN 0096 03022; Arch Street - PIN 0027 01006; and Roberson Street - PIN 0068 02016. Assistant City Manager Paylor Spruill provided an explanation for the purchase of the properties. The City expects to bundle the properties for work force housing. A builder has taken a group they offered near Main Street, and they are getting additional inquiries. *Recommendation: Approve the sale and authorize staff to execute the necessary documents to convey the requested jointly owned properties to the City of Henderson.*

Joint Public Safety Committee / Fire Commission

The two committees met, Thursday July 25, 2024 to discuss implementation of the fire study results. The recommendations are as follows:

Recommendation 1: Maintain the current Vance County Fire Department. No action or discussion right now.

Recommendation 2: Create a separate position of Fire Marshal for Vance County. Create Fire Marshal position.

Recommendation 3: Evaluate the need for additional stations to provide better coverage to areas more than six miles from an existing fire station. No action right now.

Recommendation 4: Consider “fast-forwarding” critical calls in the Communications Center. The county manager will consult with the emergency operations director.

Recommendation 5: Establish a routine process of receiving and reviewing incident reports within the Fire Marshal’s Office. Fire Marshal will handle once hired.

Recommendation 6: Formally adopt NFPA 1720. No action right now.

Recommendation 7: Improve overall turnout time performance for VCFD. The county manager to work with the fire chief and emergency operations director.

Recommendation 8: Develop a county-wide incident command system. Fire Marshal to work on written plan once hired.

Recommendation 9: All fire departments and the rescue squad should develop and adopt standards, protocols, and procedures for use in the county. Fire Marshal to work on written plan once hired.

Recommendation 10: Complete an hourly rate study of surrounding counties. Volunteer hourly rates have increased to \$17 per hour effective July 1, 2024.

Recommendation 11: Consider merging or increasing collaboration between the Vance County Fire Department and the Vance County Rescue Squad. Strengthen the relationship between VCFD and VCRS.

Recommendation 12: Modify the Goldenbelt Fire District. The county manager to research.

Recommendation 13: Hire additional county staff to provide 24-hour coverage. No action right now.

Recommendation 14: Maximize Usage of ImageTrend Software. Complete, per fire chief.

Recommendation 15: Analyze districts for Certified Water Points. Complete, per Daren Small.

Recommendation 16: Develop a fire training facility in Vance County. The county manager will work with the fire chief to identify funding opportunities.

Recommendation 17: Vance County and the City of Henderson should work with Vance-Granville Community College to develop a plan or partnership to build a centralized training facility in Vance County. The county manager will work with the fire chief to identify opportunities.

Recommendation 18: Develop a regional response team for technical rescue. The county manager to research.

Recommendation 19: Vance County Rescue Squad should engage all the fire departments in Vance County to develop a regional response team that takes advantage of fire department personnel. VCFD and VCRS to work together on this. *For your information.*

County Manager's Report to the Board

- A. Farmer's Market Week Proclamation.** The Vance County Board of Commissioners recognizes the importance of expanding agricultural marketing opportunities that assist and encourage the next generation of farmers and ranchers. *Recommendation: Proclaim the week of August 4-10, 2024 as Farmers Market Week in Vance County, in conjunction with the observance of National Farmers Market Week, and call upon Vance County citizens to celebrate farmers markets with appropriate observance and activities.*
- B. Kroger Opioid Settlement.** A tentative settlement in the opioid litigation with Kroger must be formally approved by August 12, 2024. Our national and local counsel, the NC Dept. of Justice (NCDOJ) and the NCACC have recommended acceptance of the settlement from Kroger for a \$1.37 billion global payout. The anticipated North Carolina share is approximately \$40 million. The actual share will depend upon the level of participation in the settlement by all 100 counties in North Carolina and several larger North Carolina municipalities. To put the Kroger settlement in perspective, you will recall that the initial "Distributor Settlement" (McKesson, AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health and Johnson & Johnson) is being administered pursuant to the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) agreed to by all North Carolina local governments and the NCDOJ. This was followed by the "Pharmacy Settlement" (CVS, Walmart, Walgreens, Teva and Allergan). The Pharmacy Settlement is being administered pursuant to the Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds (the SAAF) which is simply an extension of the original MOA. The SAAF was also approved and agreed to by all North Carolina local governments and the NCDOJ. Now we have the Kroger settlement which might have been included in the SAAF had the settlement been concluded at the time of approval of the SAAF, but it was not. Therefore, to cover the Kroger settlement and handle it consistently with the prior settlements, the NCDOJ has drafted a "Second Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds" (referred to as the "SAAF-2") for approval by all participating counties. Attached you will find a helpful "FAQ" regarding the Kroger settlement, a draft of the Second Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds (SAAF-2). *Recommendation: Formally authorize execution of the Kroger settlement and the SAAF-2 by retroactively approving the County Manager's signature on the agreement.*
- C. Board of E&R Meetings.** With almost 1,500 appeals and the possibility of increased appeals to the board of equalization and review, we should establish dates for the board of equalization and review to meet. The next meeting will be August 19, 2024 beginning at 4pm. This will replace your work session for August. *Recommendation: Consider scheduling additional days for the board of equalization and review.*
- D. Granville Vance Health Department.** Lisa Harrison is seeking a letter of support for the application effort to HRSA (Health Resources and Services Administration) to apply for the health department to become a New Access Point for a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC). *Recommendation: Consider approving the letter of support.*

E. Legislative Goals. The NC Association of County Commissioners (NCACC) 2024-2025 biennium legislative goals process is underway. The deadline to submit goals to NCACC is September 23, 2024. The enclosed legislative goals handbook provides a detailed summary of the legislative goals process. Commissioner Brummitt submitted the following goals for consideration:

- Legislation that will enable the support of families affected by mental health and substance use disorders. Our families have limited resources and support and are struggling immensely dealing with these issues. We need a support network in place to support the recovery of affected individuals and their families.
- Legislation that will continue ACP (Affordable Connectivity Program).
- Legislation that will repeal The Corporate Transparency Act (“CTA”). The intent of the BOI reporting requirement is to help US law enforcement combat money laundering, the financing of terrorism, and other illicit activities. It is not affordable to small business owners and can be a gross invasion on their rights to privacy.

We will also submit those goals that are considered as continuation goals from 2022.
Recommendation: Consider approving the recommended goals.

F. Position Request – Fire Marshal. Per the recommendation of AP Triton, Fire Commission, and the Public Safety Committee, I am requesting a new position effective immediately. The total cost of new this new position, to include salary, fringes, and benefits is estimated to be between \$80,688 and \$102,014. *Recommendation: Consider the creation of the Fire Marshal position effective immediately so that we can begin the recruitment and selection process. Once a candidate is selected, there will be a request for a budget amendment to fund the new role and create a separate department for the Fire Marshal’s Office.*

G. Fireworks Permit – Tourism. The Vance County Tourism Department is requesting approval of a fireworks permit for its New Year’s Eve celebration at Satterwhite Point Park at Kerr Lake on Tuesday, December 31, 2024. According to Tourism Director Pam Hester, the TDA will obtain the necessary permits and approvals from NC State Parks and the Corps of Engineers and the show will be contracted with a professional pyrotechnics firm which has the appropriate credentials and insurance coverage. *Recommendation: Approve the request from Tourism for a permit and fee waiver to discharge fireworks at its New Year’s Eve celebration at Satterwhite Point at Kerr Lake planned for Tuesday, December 31, 2024, contingent upon the necessary approvals from the fire marshal.*

H. September 2024 Regular Meeting. As a reminder, the September meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 3, 2024 since Monday, September 2, 2024 is the Labor Day holiday. *For your information.*

Part 1 of this FAQ answers questions about the Kroger Settlement, and Part 2 answers questions about the Second Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds (“SAAF-2”).

2. What if there is a discrepancy between this FAQ and the Kroger Settlement or SAAF-2?

If there is a discrepancy between this FAQ and the Kroger Settlement or SAAF-2, then the Kroger Settlement or SAAF-2 take precedence. This FAQ is an effort to explain the Kroger Settlement and SAAF-2 in user-friendly terms, but this FAQ is not itself a binding legal document.

3. What is the Kroger Settlement?

In addition to the national opioid settlements with the “big three” drug distributors plus Johnson & Johnson (“Wave One Settlements”) and the national settlements with CVS, Walgreens, Walmart, Allergan and Teva (“Wave Two Settlements”), Attorney General Josh Stein helped negotiate a national settlement with the Kroger Company (“Kroger”) regarding the unlawful dispensing of opioids from pharmacies in the grocery stores it operates, including at Harris-Teeter grocery stores. Read the press release [HERE](#).

4. How much money will the Kroger Settlement bring to North Carolina?

North Carolina's state and local governments stand to receive just over \$40 million from the Kroger Settlement, in addition to amounts they may receive from the Wave One Settlements, Wave Two Settlements, and relevant bankruptcy resolutions.

5. Which North Carolina local governments will receive funds from the Kroger Settlement?

The same local governments that receive funds from the Wave One Settlements (governed by the 2021 Memorandum of Agreement or "MOA") and the Wave Two Settlements (governed by the 2023 Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds (or "SAAF")) will receive funds under the Kroger Settlement.

To be more specific: Local governments entitled to receive direct payments under the settlements are the 100 North Carolina counties plus any municipality that either filed suit against opioid defendants, or had a population of 75,000 or more in 2019, or both.

Based on those criteria, the municipalities entitled to receive funds from the Kroger settlement are Asheville, Canton, Cary, Charlotte, Concord, Durham, Fayetteville, Gastonia, Greensboro, Greenville, Henderson, Hickory, High Point, Jacksonville, Raleigh, Wilmington, Winston-Salem.

Note that some municipalities entitled to receive direct payments under the Wave One and Wave Two settlements have chosen to direct opioid settlement payments to their respective counties. This option is available for the Kroger Settlement as well. Municipalities interested in learning more about this option should email NC DOJ at opioidsettlement@ncdoj.gov.

6. How much funding will North Carolina local governments receive from the Kroger Settlement?

As with the Wave One Settlements and Wave Two Settlements, North Carolina will receive its full share of payments from the Kroger Settlement only if all required local governments sign onto the settlement. And Kroger will agree to finalize the Kroger Settlement only if the vast majority of local governments across the nation sign on.

If all required local governments sign onto the Kroger Settlement in North Carolina, and a sufficient number of local governments join the Kroger Settlement across the nation, then the maximum amount that each local government could receive from the Kroger Settlement is available [HERE](#) on the "Kroger Settlement" page of DOJ's www.MorePowerfulNC.org website.

7. Which local governments need to sign onto the Kroger Settlement for North Carolina to receive the full share of settlement funding to which it is entitled?

Local governments that must sign the Kroger Settlement for North Carolina to receive the full share of settlement funding to which it is entitled include:

- all 100 counties,
- the 17 municipalities listed above that are entitled to receive opioid settlement funds, and
- all other municipalities that had a population of 30,000 or greater in 2019.

8. So there are some municipalities that are asked to sign the Kroger Settlement even though they do not receive direct funding under the settlements? Why is that?

Residents of all municipalities in North Carolina – including those that receive settlement funds directly and those that do not receive settlement funds directly – stand to benefit from state and local programs and services supported with opioid settlement funds.

There are 19 municipalities that signed the Wave One and Wave Two Settlements that are now asked to sign the Kroger Settlement even though they are not entitled to receive direct payments under settlement. By signing onto the Kroger Settlement (along with prior settlements they already joined), these municipalities help ensure that North Carolina receives the full amount of settlement funds to which it is entitled.

9. What actions are required for a local government to join the Kroger Settlement?

To join the Kroger settlement and sign onto the SAAF-2, local governments follow a two-step process:

FIRST, the governing board of the local government passes a new resolution authorizing designated local officials to sign onto the Kroger Settlement and SAAF-2. To assist with this step, a draft resolution template is available [HERE](#) for counties and [HERE](#) for municipalities.

Note that some counties and municipalities may have previously passed resolutions as part of signing onto the Wave One or Wave Two Settlements that provide authorization for local government officials to sign onto the Kroger Settlement. Local governments are encouraged to consult their local legal counsel on the wording of prior resolutions to determine if a new resolution is required.

SECOND, after receiving authorization from their respective governing boards, designated local officials (such as managers or attorneys) will sign onto the Kroger Settlement and SAAF-2 through an electronic sign-on process. We anticipate that on June 14, 2024, all 100 counties and the 36 municipalities identified above will receive an email from the national administrator, Rubris, inviting each local government to sign

onto the Kroger Settlement and SAAF-2. (Rubris will use the email addresses that each local government previously provided to Rubris.)

10. What is the deadline for local governments to sign onto the Kroger Settlement and the SAAF-2?

August 12, 2024 is the deadline to sign onto the Kroger Settlement and the SAAF-2.

11. When will North Carolina receive funds from the Kroger Settlement?

If the sign-on to the Kroger Settlement in North Carolina and across the nation goes well, and Kroger agrees to finalize the settlements (as explained in question 6 above), we anticipate that the first Kroger Settlement payment to the 100 counties and relevant municipalities during Fiscal Year 2024-2025.

The Kroger Settlement payments will be made over 11 years, with roughly equal payments each year.

12. Will local governments have to spend the Kroger funds right away?

No. Under the MOA, SAAF, and SAAF-2, local governments are NOT required to spend funds from the various settlements during the same fiscal year in which the funds are received. Instead, local governments are allowed to develop multi-year plans and to spend opioid settlement funds when it makes most sense for them to do so.

PART 2: SECOND SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDS (“SAAF-2”)

14. What is the purpose of the Second Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds From (“SAAF-2”)?

The purpose of the SAAF-2 is to direct funds from the Kroger Settlement to the state of North Carolina and local governments in a manner consistent with the 2021 Memorandum of Agreement (“MOA”) that has governed the distribution, use, and reporting of funds from previous national opioid settlements and bankruptcy resolutions.

15. Under the SAAF-2, do funds from the Kroger Settlement go into the same special revenue fund as funds from the previous national opioid settlements?

The SAAF-2 provides that every local government receiving funds from the Kroger Settlement must do one of the following two things:

1. Deposit the funds from the Kroger Settlement into the same special revenue fund used for funds from the previous national opioid settlements; or
2. Create a separate special revenue fund for funds from the Kroger Settlement if there is a desire to do so.

It is important to understand that the 2021 MOA, 2023 SAAF, and 2024 SAAF-2 allow local governments to combine funds from Wave One Settlements, Wave Two Settlements, Kroger Settlement, and relevant bankruptcy resolutions into a single fund for spending and reporting purposes. Local governments are NOT required to develop separate accounting or reporting requirements for funds from the various settlements.

16. Regarding the USE of opioid settlement funds, how does the SAAF-2 compare to the MOA and SAAF?

Regarding the use of opioid settlement funds, the 2021 MOA, 2023 SAAF, and 2024 SAAF-2 are identical. Funds from the Wave One settlements (under the MOA), Wave Two settlements (under the SAAF and MOA), and Kroger Settlement (under the SAAF-2 and MOA) are all subject to the same rules and guidelines as to how local governments may use those funds.

For example, Option A and Option B (as described in the MOA) apply to funds from the Kroger Settlement the same way they apply to funds from the prior opioid settlements and bankruptcy resolutions. Similarly, all of the auditing, compliance, reporting, and accountability provisions in the MOA apply to funds from the Kroger Settlement in the same way they apply to funds from the prior opioid settlements and bankruptcy resolutions.

17. Regarding the REPORTING of opioid settlement funds, how does the SAAF-2 compare to the MOA and SAAF?

With respect to reporting requirements, funds from the Kroger Settlement (under the SAAF-2) and Wave Two Settlements (under the SAAF) are subject to all the exact same reporting requirements as funds under the Wave One Settlements (under the MOA).

As noted above, the 2021 MOA, 2023 SAAF, and 2024 SAAF-2 allow local governments to combine funds from the various national opioid settlements into a single fund for spending and reporting purposes. The MOA, SAAF, and SAAF-2 do NOT require that local governments develop separate accounting or reporting requirements for funds from different national opioid settlements and bankruptcy resolutions.

18. Regarding the ALLOCATION of opioid settlement funds, how does the SAAF-2 compare to the MOA and SAAF?

Regarding the allocation of opioid settlement funds, the 2021 MOA, 2023 SAAF, and 2024 SAAF-2 are nearly identical:

- The MOA, SAAF, and SAAF-2 direct 15 percent of each payment from the various national opioid settlements to the State of North Carolina.
- The MOA directs 85 percent of each payment from the Wave One Settlements to local governments, including all 100 counties and the 17 municipalities identified in question 5 above.
- The SAAF and SAAF-2 direct 84.62 percent of each payment from the Wave Two Settlements and Kroger Settlement to local governments, including all 100 counties and the relevant municipalities identified above.
- The SAAF and SAAF-2 direct 0.38 percent of each payment from the Wave Two Settlements and Kroger Settlement to private attorneys who have a principal office in North Carolina that have represented local governments in opioid litigation (“Local Counsel”).

19. Why do the SAAF and SAAF-2 direct funds to Local Counsel?

The Wave One Settlements, Wave Two Settlements, and Kroger Settlement all provide national attorney fee and cost funds that compensate the attorneys who filed suit and litigated on behalf of local governments across the country. The out-of-state counsel who pursued the federal court litigation filed by more than 75 counties and municipalities in North Carolina will receive substantial amounts from these national funds. However, only a small portion of these national funds go to the North Carolina-based lawyers who have also represented North Carolina counties and municipalities in opioid litigation.

During the sign-on process for the Wave One Settlements, some counties and municipalities hesitated to join the settlements because of concerns about whether outside counsel would seek to enforce contingency fee arrangements.

To ensure that North Carolina obtained 100% participation in the Wave Two Settlements, which was necessary for North Carolina to receive 100% of its funds, the SAAF provided a small fund to Local Counsel in exchange for their clear advance commitment to waive their fee claims against all North Carolina counties and municipalities.

In a similar vein, to ensure that North Carolina obtains 100% participation in the Kroger Settlement, which is necessary for North Carolina to receive 100% of its funds as explained in question 6 above, the SAAF-2 provides a small fund to Local Counsel in exchange for their clear advance commitment to waive their fee claims against all North Carolina counties and municipalities.

20. Does the SAAF-2 impose any conditions for Local Counsel to receive funds?

Yes. The SAAF-2 provides funds from the Kroger Settlement to Local Counsel only if:

- All North Carolina counties and municipalities that filed lawsuits against the defendants who were part of the Wave One Settlements, Wave Two Settlements, and Kroger Settlement join the Kroger Settlement by the August 12 deadline.
- Local Counsel release all North Carolina counties and municipalities from any claim regarding the obligation to pay legal fees or costs relating to their representation of North Carolina counties and municipalities regarding opioid claims and litigation against Kroger.
- National Counsel release all North Carolina counties and municipalities from any contractual obligation to pay legal fees or costs relating to their representation of North Carolina counties and municipalities regarding opioid claims and litigation against Kroger.

All of the above conditions must be met in order for Local Counsel to receive funds. If any of the above conditions are not met, the SAAF-2 allocates no Kroger Settlement funds to Local Counsel.

A new proposed national opioids settlement (“*New National Opioids Settlement*”) has been reached with Kroger (“*Settling Defendant*”). This *Participation Package* is a follow-up communication to the *Notice of National Opioids Settlement* recently received electronically by your subdivision.

You are receiving this *Participation Package* because North Carolina is participating in the Kroger settlement.

This electronic envelope contains:

- The *Participation Form* for the Kroger settlement, including a release of any claims.
- The North Carolina Second Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds from Additional Settlements of Opioid Litigation (“*SAAF-2*”).

The *Participation Form* must be executed, without alteration, and submitted on or before August 12, 2024, in order for your subdivision to be considered for initial participation calculations and payment eligibility.

The SAAF-2 is a supplement to the North Carolina Memorandum of Agreement (“*MOA*”) on the allocation, use, and reporting of funds from the prior Wave One and Wave Two opioid settlements.

Based upon subdivision participation forms received on or before August 12, 2024, the subdivision participation rate will be used to determine whether participation is sufficient for the settlement to move forward and whether a state earns its maximum potential payment under the settlement. If the settlement moves forward, your release will become effective. If a settlement does not move forward, that release will not become effective.

Any subdivision that does not participate cannot directly share in the settlement funds, even if the subdivision’s state is settling and other participating subdivisions are sharing in settlement funds. Any subdivision that does not participate may also reduce the amount of money for programs to remediate the opioid crisis in its state. Please note, a subdivision will not necessarily directly receive settlement funds by

participating; decisions on how settlement funds will be allocated within a state are subject to the North Carolina SAAF-2 and MOA.

You are encouraged to discuss the terms and benefits of the *New National Opioids Settlement* with your counsel, the North Carolina Attorney General's Office, the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, and the North Carolina League of Municipalities.

1. The Governmental Entity is aware of and has reviewed the Kroger Settlement, understands that all terms in this Participation and Release Form have the meanings defined therein, and agrees that by executing this Participation and Release Form, the Governmental Entity elects to participate in the Kroger Settlement and become a Participating Subdivision as provided therein.
2. The Governmental Entity shall promptly, and in any event no later than 14 days after the Reference Date and prior to the filing of the Consent Judgment, dismiss with prejudice any Released Claims that it has filed. With respect to any Released Claims pending in *In re National Prescription Opiate Litigation*, MDL No. 2804, the Governmental Entity authorizes the Plaintiffs’ Executive Committee to execute and file on behalf of the Governmental Entity a Stipulation of Dismissal with Prejudice substantially in the form found at <https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/>.
3. The Governmental Entity agrees to the terms of the Kroger Settlement pertaining to Participating Subdivisions as defined therein.
4. By agreeing to the terms of the Kroger Settlement and becoming a Releasor, the Governmental Entity is entitled to the benefits provided therein, including, if applicable, monetary payments beginning after the Effective Date.
5. The Governmental Entity agrees to use any monies it receives through the Kroger Settlement solely for the purposes provided therein.
6. The Governmental Entity submits to the jurisdiction of the court in the Governmental Entity’s state where the Consent Judgment is filed for purposes limited to that court’s role as provided in, and for resolving disputes to the extent provided in, the Kroger Settlement. The Governmental Entity likewise agrees to arbitrate before the National



Arbitration Panel as provided in, and for resolving disputes to the extent otherwise provided in, the Kroger Settlement.

7. The Governmental Entity has the right to enforce the Kroger Settlement as provided therein.
8. The Governmental Entity, as a Participating Subdivision, hereby becomes a Releasor for all purposes in the Kroger Settlement, including without limitation all provisions of Section XI (Release), and along with all departments, agencies, divisions, boards, commissions, districts, instrumentalities of any kind and attorneys, and any person in their official capacity elected or appointed to serve any of the foregoing and any agency, person, or other entity claiming by or through any of the foregoing, and any other entity identified in the definition of Releasor, provides for a release to the fullest extent of its authority. As a Releasor, the Governmental Entity hereby absolutely, unconditionally, and irrevocably covenants not to bring, file, or claim, or to cause, assist or permit to be brought, filed, or claimed, or to otherwise seek to establish liability for any Released Claims against any Released Entity in any forum whatsoever. The releases provided for in the Kroger Settlement are intended by the Parties to be broad and shall be interpreted so as to give the Released Entities the broadest possible bar against any liability relating in any way to Released Claims and extend to the full extent of the power of the Governmental Entity to release claims. The Kroger Settlement shall be a complete bar to any Released Claim.
9. The Governmental Entity hereby takes on all rights and obligations of a Participating Subdivision as set forth in the Kroger Settlement.
10. In connection with the releases provided for in the Kroger Settlement, each Governmental Entity expressly waives, releases, and forever discharges any and all provisions, rights, and benefits conferred by any law of any state or territory of the United States or other jurisdiction, or principle of common law, which is similar, comparable, or equivalent to § 1542 of the California Civil Code, which reads:

General Release; extent. A general release does not extend to claims that the creditor or releasing party does not know or suspect to exist in his or her favor at the time of executing the release that, if known by him or her would have materially affected his or her settlement with the debtor or released party.

A Releasor may hereafter discover facts other than or different from those which it knows, believes, or assumes to be true with respect to the Released Claims, but each Governmental Entity hereby expressly waives and fully, finally, and forever settles, releases and discharges, upon the Effective Date, any and all Released Claims that may exist as of such date but which Releasors do not know or suspect to exist, whether through ignorance, oversight, error, negligence or through no fault whatsoever, and which, if known, would materially affect the Governmental Entities' decision to participate in the Kroger Settlement.



11. Nothing herein is intended to modify in any way the terms of the Kroger Settlement, to which Governmental Entity hereby agrees. To the extent this Participation and Release Form is interpreted differently from the Kroger Settlement in any respect, the Kroger Settlement controls.

Second Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds From Additional Settlement of Opioid Litigation (“SAAF-2”)

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Second Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds (“SAAF-2”) is to direct Kroger Funds from the Kroger Settlement to the state of North Carolina and local governments in a manner consistent with the 2021 Memorandum of Agreement (“MOA”) Between the State of North Carolina and Local Governments on Proceeds Relating to the Settlement of Opioid Litigation (finalized in 2022) as well as the 2023 Supplemental Agreement for Additional Funds From Additional Settlements of Opioid Litigation (“SAAF”), which govern the distribution of Opioid Settlement Funds to the State and its Local Governments.

This SAAF-2 does not change the scope or meaning of the MOA or SAAF with respect to Opioid Settlement Funds governed by the MOA or Additional Funds governed by the SAAF, respectively. Instead, this SAAF-2 applies the terms of the MOA – with certain clarifications noted below – to the Kroger Funds from the Kroger Settlement described below.

II. SCOPE

- A. Scope of the MOA. Under the terms of the MOA, the MOA governs Opioid Settlement Funds from:
1. The National Settlement Agreement with the drug distributors Cardinal, McKesson, and AmerisourceBergen and the drug maker Johnson & Johnson and its subsidiary Janssen Pharmaceuticals; and
 2. The Bankruptcy Resolution with Mallinckrodt; the Bankruptcy Resolution with Endo; any Bankruptcy Resolution with Purdue; and any other Bankruptcy Resolution as the term “Bankruptcy Resolution” is defined in the MOA.
- B. Scope of the SAAF. The SAAF governs Additional Funds from the Additional Settlements with Additional Settling Defendants Walmart, Inc., Teva Pharmaceutical Industries Ltd., Allergan Finance, LLC, Allergan Limited, CVS Health Corporation, CVS Pharmacy, Inc., and Walgreen Co., as well as their subsidiaries, affiliates, officers, and directors named in the Additional Settlements.
- C. This SAAF-2 governs Kroger Funds from the Kroger Settlement as described below.



III. APPLICATION OF THE MOA TO THE KROGER SETTLEMENT AND FUNDS

The MOA, which is incorporated herein by reference, governs the Kroger Settlement and Kroger Funds in every respect, except as set forth hereinbelow. In the event of any conflict between the MOA and this SAAF-2, with respect to the Kroger Settlement and Kroger Funds, the provisions of this SAAF-2 shall take precedence.

A. Definitions.

1. The definitions used in the MOA and the SAAF are incorporated by reference into this SAAF-2.
2. “Kroger” means the Kroger Co., as well as its subsidiaries, affiliates, officers, and directors named in the Kroger Settlement.
3. “Kroger Funds” means all funds allocated by the Kroger Settlement to the State or Local Governments for purposes of opioid remediation activities, as well as any repayment of those funds and any interest or investment earnings that may accrue as those funds are temporarily held before being expended on opioid remediation strategies. Not included are funds made available in the Kroger Settlement for the payment of the Parties’ litigation expenses or the reimbursement of the United States Government.
4. “Kroger Settlement” means a national opioid settlement agreement with the Parties and Kroger concerning alleged misconduct in manufacture, marketing, promotion, distribution, or dispensing of an opioid analgesic.
5. “Local Counsel” means legal counsel and law firms who have a principal office in North Carolina and represented one or more North Carolina counties and municipalities in litigation against one or more Additional Settling Defendant or Kroger concerning opioids.
6. “National Counsel” means legal counsel and law firms who have a principal office outside of North Carolina and represented various North Carolina counties and municipalities in litigation concerning opioids against one or more Settling Defendant, Additional Settling Defendant, or Kroger.
7. “Required Local Governments” means all North Carolina counties and municipalities that have filed litigation against any of the Settling Defendants, Additional Settling Defendants, or Kroger.



B. Allocation of Additional Funds

1. Method of distribution. Pursuant to the Kroger Settlement, Kroger Funds shall be distributed directly to the State, Local Governments, and Local Counsel for such uses as set forth in the MOA and this SAAF-2, provided Kroger Funds shall not be considered funds of the State, any Local Governments, or any Local Counsel unless and until such time as each distribution is made.
2. Overall allocation of funds. Kroger Funds shall be allocated as follows with respect to each payment from Kroger: (i) 15% directly to the State (“State Kroger Abatement Fund”), (ii) 84.62% to abatement funds established by Local Governments (“Local Kroger Abatement Funds”), and (iii) 0.38% to a Local Counsel Fee Fund described in section IV of this SAAF-2.
3. The allocation of Local Kroger Abatement Funds between Local Governments shall be as described in MOA section B.3. However, to the extent required by the terms of the Kroger Settlement, the proportions set forth in MOA Exhibit G shall be adjusted: (i) to provide no payment from the Kroger Settlement to any listed county or municipality that does not participate in the Kroger Settlement; and (ii) to provide a reduced payment from the Kroger Settlement to any listed county or municipality that signs onto the Kroger Settlement after the deadline specified by the Kroger Settlement.
4. Municipal allocations of Local Kroger Abatement Funds shall be as described in MOA section B.4. Consistent with the manner in which MOA section B.4.b has been interpreted by the parties to the MOA with respect to Opioid Settlement Funds, a municipality that directs Local Kroger Abatement Funds to the county or counties in which it is located pursuant to MOA section B.4 shall be relieved of any reporting or other obligations under the MOA with respect to the redirected funds.
5. The use of Kroger Funds for opioid remediation activities shall be as described in MOA section B.5.
6. All Parties acknowledge and agree the Kroger Settlement will require a Local Government to release all its claims against Kroger to receive Kroger Funds. All Parties further acknowledge and agree based on the terms of the Kroger Settlement, a Local Government may receive funds through this SAAF-2 only after complying with all requirements set forth in the Kroger Settlement to release its claims.



C. Payment of Litigating and Non-Litigating Parties

No party engaged in litigating the MDL Matter shall receive a smaller payment than a similarly situated non-litigating Party, other than as based on the Allocation Proportions in MOA Exhibit G.

D. Special Revenue Fund

Every Local Government receiving Kroger Funds shall either (1) deposit the Kroger Funds in the special revenue fund that the Local Government created for Opioid Settlement Funds pursuant to MOA section D.1 and/or Additional Funds pursuant to SAAF section D.1 or (2) create a separate special revenue fund as described in MOA section D.1 that is designated for the receipt and expenditure of the Kroger Funds. In either case, every Local Government receiving Kroger Funds shall abide by MOA section D and other relevant provisions of the MOA with respect to the Kroger Funds in the special revenue fund.

E. Opioid Remediation Activities

1. Local Governments shall expend Kroger Funds according to the requirements for Opioid Settlement Funds stated in MOA section E.
2. The coordination group established by MOA section E.7 and described in MOA Exhibit D shall have the same responsibilities with respect to remediation activities funded by Kroger Funds and related requirements and procedures that it has with respect to the Opioid Settlement Funds covered by the MOA.

F. Auditing, Compliance, Reporting, and Accountability

1. The Auditing, Compliance, Reporting, and Accountability provisions stated in MOA section F shall apply to Kroger Funds in the way they apply to Opioid Settlement Funds.
2. The coordination group established by MOA section E.7 and described in MOA Exhibit D shall have the same responsibilities with respect to auditing, compliance, reporting, and accountability provisions relating to Kroger Funds that it has with respect to the Opioid Settlement Funds covered by the MOA.



G. Effectiveness

1. When this SAAF-2 takes effect. This SAAF-2 shall become effective at the time a sufficient number of Local Governments have joined the SAAF-2 to qualify the SAAF-2 as a State-Subdivision Agreement under the Kroger Settlement. If this SAAF-2 does not thereby qualify as a State-Subdivision Agreement, this SAAF-2 will have no effect.
2. Amendments to the SAAF-2.
 - a. Amendments to conform to final national documents. The Attorney General, with the consent of a majority vote from a group of Local Government attorneys appointed by the Association of County Commissioners, may initiate a process to amend this SAAF-2 to make any changes required by the final provisions of the Kroger Settlement. The Attorney General's Office will provide written notice of the necessary amendments to all the previously joining parties. Any previously joining party will have a two-week opportunity to withdraw from the SAAF-2. The amendments will be effective to any party that does not withdraw.
 - b. Coordination group. The coordination group may make the changes to the SAAF-2 described and authorized in MOA Exhibit D.
 - c. No amendments to allocation between Local Governments. Notwithstanding any other provision of this SAAF-2, the allocation proportions set forth in MOA Exhibit G may not be amended.
 - d. General amendment power. After execution, the coordination group may propose other amendments to the SAAF-2, subject to the limitation in Section G.2.c of this SAAF-2. Such amendments will take effect only if approved in writing by the Attorney General and at least two-thirds of the Local Governments who are Parties to this SAAF-2. In the vote, each Local Government Party will have a number of votes measured by the allocation proportions set forth in MOA Exhibit G.
3. Acknowledgement. The Parties acknowledge this SAAF-2 is an effective and fair way to address the needs arising from the public health crisis due to the misconduct committed by the Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants.



4. When SAAF-2 is no longer in effect. This SAAF-2 is effective until one year after the last date on which any (a) Opioid Settlement Funds are being spent by Local Governments pursuant to the National Settlement Agreement and any Bankruptcy Resolution, or (b) Additional Funds are being spent by Local Governments pursuant to the Additional Settlements, or (c) Kroger Funds are being spent by Local Governments pursuant to the Kroger Settlement.
5. Application of SAAF-2 to settlements. This SAAF-2 applies to the Kroger Settlement.
6. Applicable law and venue. Unless required otherwise by the Kroger Settlement, this SAAF-2 shall be interpreted using North Carolina law and any action related to the provisions of this SAAF-2 must be adjudicated by the Superior Court of Wake County. If any provision of this SAAF-2 is held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, this invalidity does not affect any other provision which can be given effect without the invalid provision.
7. Scope of this SAAF-2. The Parties acknowledge this SAAF-2 does not excuse any requirements placed upon them by the terms of the Kroger Settlement, except to the extent those terms allow for a State-Subdivision Agreement to do so.
8. No third party beneficiaries. No person or entity is intended to be a third party beneficiary of this SAAF-2.
9. No effect on authority of parties. Nothing in this SAAF-2 shall be construed to affect or constrain the authority of the Parties under law.
10. Signing and execution of this SAAF-2. This SAAF-2 may be signed and executed simultaneously in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same agreement. A signature transmitted by facsimile, electronic image, or DocuSign shall be deemed an original signature for purposes of executing this SAAF-2. Each person signing this SAAF-2 represents he or she is fully authorized to enter into the terms and conditions of, and to execute, this SAAF-2, and all necessary approvals and conditions precedent to execution have been satisfied.



IV. LOCAL COUNSEL FEE FUND

Local Counsel have reviewed the Kroger Settlement, find it to be equitable, and recommend their clients execute the Kroger Settlement and this SAAF-2. If (1) all Local Counsel sign this SAAF-2 whereby they consent to the terms of this SAAF-2 and agree to be legally bound by this SAAF-2, including but not limited to Section IV of this SAAF-2, and (2) all Required Local Governments agree on or before August 12, 2024 to execute the Kroger Settlement, and dismiss litigation against Kroger (if applicable), as required by the Kroger Settlement, then each Local Counsel shall be entitled to receive a portion of the Local Counsel Fee Fund for the Kroger Settlement, in such proportions as set forth below. If one or more Required Local Governments does not execute the Kroger Settlement, and dismiss litigation (if applicable), as required by the Kroger Settlement, then the 0.38% share of Kroger Funds set forth in Section III.B.2 of this SAAF-2 for the Local Counsel Fee Fund shall be included in the Local Kroger Abatement Funds, such that 85% of the Kroger Funds will be allocated to Local Kroger Abatement Funds, and 0% will be allocated to the Local Counsel Fee Fund.


Local Counsel release all North Carolina counties and municipalities from any claim regarding the obligation to pay legal fees or costs relating to their representation of North Carolina counties and municipalities regarding opioid claims and litigation against Kroger. Local Counsel retain their rights to recover legal fees from any national legal fee fund established by a national settlement and to collect any fees due from National Counsel. If one or more National Counsel fails to release its North Carolina client counties and/or municipalities from any contractual obligation to pay legal fees or costs relating to their representation of North Carolina counties and municipalities regarding opioid claims and litigation against Kroger, as required for National Counsel and Local Counsel to receive a portion of the national fee funds created by the Kroger Settlement, then the 0.38% share of Kroger Funds set forth in Section III.B.2 of this SAAF-2 for the Local Counsel Fee Fund shall be included in the Local Kroger Abatement Funds, such that 85% of the Kroger Funds will be allocated to Local Kroger Abatement Funds, and 0% will be allocated to the Local Counsel Fee Fund.

The proportion of the Local Counsel Fee Fund to be received by each Local Counsel will be the same as for the Local Counsel Fee Fund created by the SAAF. Each Local Counsel's release of claims against all North Carolina counties and municipalities as provided above shall remain in full force and effect regardless of the proportion of the Local Counsel Fee Fund that any Local Counsel receives.

On behalf of the Vance County Board of Commissioners we would like to pledge our full support to Granville Vance Public Health (GVPH) in your effort to gain Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) status. We are proud of the work your staff accomplishes in our community. We will continue to make it a priority to work with you to address the health rankings in Vance County and ensure safety net health services are available for those who need access to primary care, behavioral health, dental care, and public health programs. Local funding is not available to support primary care at this time, but we are glad for you to continue to seek grant funding and offer high-quality services to those who need access to care.

Granville Vance Public Health has created several new programs since 2015 to work toward becoming a community health center, such as starting primary care, offering integrated care approaches together with behavioral health providers, and being the first local health department in North Carolina to offer Medication for Opioid Disorder (MOUD) in an office-based setting. GVPH and local schools in Vance County are working together toward implementing additional HRSA-funded grant programs in behavioral health for 5-18 year-olds. Top Priority Goals

- Seek legislation, funding, and other efforts to expand digital infrastructure/broadband capability to the unserved and under-served areas and residents of the state.
- Seek additional revenue sources to address statewide public school and community college capital needs and ensure methods used to distribute school capital funding considers the needs of both low-wealth and growing counties. Revisions to the Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund that will allow for more access to counties and allow for faster school construction to include allowing projects that have not previously been awarded a grant to commence and remain eligible for future grant application periods.
- Support expansion of Medicaid as well as related funding and operational flexibility for counties to expand county workforce and necessary infrastructure.

Legislative Priorities

Environment

- Seek legislation to provide additional resources for preventative storm damage maintenance, such as stream clearing, and increase recurring funding to the state's Coastal Storm Damage Mitigation Fund.
- Seek legislation for clean water funds throughout the state and to hold chemical manufacturers producing emerging contaminants such as PFOA, PFOS, and other PFAS chemicals, and coal ash producers financially responsible for cleanup and mitigation of pollutants.

General Government

- Seek legislation to grow North Carolina's statewide economy through state investments, including technical assistance, public infrastructure funding, increased competitive incentives, state economic development grant programs and coordinated efforts with county economic development services.

Health and Human Services

- Seek additional funding and preserve block grant allocations to increase access to high quality childcare, early childhood education, child welfare services, adult protective services and guardianship, including:
 - Women's and Children's Health Services Block Grant funding to local health departments for critical services like maternal health, child health and women's health services to address unfavorable infant mortality rates;
 - Home & Community Care Block Grant; Senior Center General Purpose Funds; Social Services and Human Services Block Grants; TANF; and emergency childcare funding to ensure the safety and stability of our childcare system.
- Seek legislation that restores State Funding of Accreditation of Local Health Departments.

Justice and Public Safety

- Seek legislation to increase the amount paid to county jails by the state to the full cost reimbursement for housing sentenced inmates.

Tax and Finance

- Seek legislation that preserves existing local revenue by providing just compensation to counties for property acquired by the state and removed from the ad valorem tax base.
- Seek legislation which will repeal NCGS 105-275(45) which mandates that counties must exclude eighty percent (80%) of the appraised value of a solar energy electric system from property taxation. If repeal of NCGS 105-275(45) is not feasible, then seek legislation which will require that the State of North Carolina provide funding to any county which is forced to lose tax revenue due to NCGS 105-275(45) in an amount equal to the lost tax revenue to said county.
- Seek legislation allowing counties to include specific language on the sales tax referendum ballot designating how the proposed proceeds will be spent and to spend the proceeds of any newly enacted article 43 transit tax for all types of transportation expenditures.
- Seek legislation to give counties flexibility with use of occupancy taxes.

Additional County Advocacy Goals

Agriculture

- Support efforts to change grants and loan award criteria to more closely match the USDA Rural Development aid requirements.
- Support legislation to protect farming operations from frivolous nuisance lawsuits.
- Support regulations and economic policies that promote small family farms.

Environment

- Support funding for a comprehensive approach to mitigate harmful and invasive species.
- Support additional funding to assist local governments in managing recycling and solid waste including: scrap tires, manufactured homes, and electronics.
- Support legislation amending NCGS §90A-53 to shorten the work experience in the field of environmental health practice necessary to receive a certificate as a Registered Environmental Health Specialists from two years to one year.

General Government

- Support increased state funding and additional funding streams for existing and new transportation construction and maintenance needs (including roads, rails, and multi-modal transportation, secondary roads and litter pickup), and support legislation to ensure that the Strategic Transportation Investments (STI) funding formula recognizes that one size does not fit all and that projects in both rural and urban areas are prioritized and funded.
- Support legislation allowing public bodies to provide emergency meeting notices by electronic means in addition to notice through newspaper with general circulation within the county.
- Support legislation allowing counties flexibility in holding remote board meetings, allowing contemporaneous, virtual public hearings, in order to expeditiously conduct county business during locally declared emergencies.

Health and Human Services

- Support expansion of Medicaid as well as related funding and operational flexibility for counties to expand county workforce and necessary infrastructure.
- Support Medicaid reimbursement for Community Paramedic services and transport services to mental health and substance abuse facilities.
- Support legislation to increase the number of state funded county Veteran Services Officers to at least one per county.
- Support legislation for hold harmless provisions and staggered payment plans to control/cap the liability to counties under the Medicaid and NCHC overpayment recoupment plan, which holds counties financially responsible for the erroneous issuance of Medicaid benefits and Medicaid claim payments resulting when the county DSS takes any action that requires payment of Medicaid claims for an ineligible individual.
- Support legislation to expand the Good Samaritan protection of covered offenses in NCGS §90-96.2(c3) to include all opioid and drug offenses to encourage reporting of drug overdoses and reduce overdose deaths and work to create required treatment options for overdose victims covered by limited immunity.
- Support legislation that promotes opioid and other substance use prevention, intervention, harm reduction, treatment and recovery initiatives.

Justice and Public Safety

- Support legislation that promotes recruitment and retention of both first responders and detention officers in jails, including but not limited to workforce development, pay scale adjustments and/ or studies, and appropriate levels of training and certification standards for these increasingly hard to staff positions.
- Support legislation to streamline and expedite the state response to emergency recovery.
- Support legislation treating all misdemeanor charges uniformly by removing statutorily imposed compliance defenses to local ordinance violations.
- Support efforts to provide greater flexibility to local governments in expenditures of 911 surcharge funds and ensure adequate funding for next-gen technology.

- Support legislation to provide exceptions to the K-3 class size mandate including but not limited to lack of school facility space and availability of qualified teachers.
- Support legislation that promotes education attainment and career and college readiness by increasing funding for apprenticeship and internship programs, trade certification, and workforce development programs, as well as increased student support services in public schools with a focus on dropout prevention and an increase in the dropout age.
- Support increased funding to aid counties in implementing school security measures.
- Support school calendar policy that promotes optimal student outcomes and best meets the needs of local communities.
- Support funding to provide all public school students with an excellent education, including investments to assist communities in eliminating achievement disparities including:
 - Expanding teaching assistant allotments to fund assistants in all K-3 classrooms.
 - Provide full state funding for state mandated exceptional student services.

Federal Goals

- Support additional flexibility and an extension in the deadline for spending American Rescue Plan (ARP) State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF).

Vance County

Proposed Legislative Goals

- 1. Tire Disposal - Support legislation to restore previous year funding levels to counties within the state tire program and support legislation assisting counties with growing numbers and costs associated with tire disposal.**

Funding for the state tire program that reimburses counties for tire disposal was changed from a formula based allocation to a flat amount during legislative changes in 2017. This essentially decreased the reimbursement funding back to counties by half (roughly \$400,000 statewide currently). Recently counties are seeing the impact of this change as the funds within the state tire program have been depleted. Along with this, counties are seeing more tires being brought to our facilities with many of them being illegal or culled tires (used tires purchased by the truckload where state tire tax was not paid). This is creating a challenging situation for county's solid waste funds.

- 2. Broadband – Request funding, support, and flexibility within GREAT grant funds and other funds for expanding broadband access to rural communities.**

High speed internet access is critical to enhancing education, economic development, health care, and public safety. While the GREAT grant was created to assist, the current practice of limiting GREAT grant funds to certain census tracts needs to be revisited and updated. Additionally, based upon feedback from our GREAT grant recipient (ISP company), the program seems to favor larger incumbent providers over the smaller, less capitalized providers. Smaller providers are not in a position to show cash in hand or a line of credit for 100% of the project cost and in Vance County's case, the local government commitment to the overall county project did not match up well with the GREAT grant matching requirements. With the importance placed on expanding broadband to rural North Carolina, further relaxations of grant requirement would be a benefit to increasing the pace of broadband to rural areas. Also, additional funding and resources are needed to close the gap in the rural vs. urban broadband divide.

- 3. Electronics Waste - Support legislation to remove computer equipment and televisions from the list of banned items from landfills or provide additional state funding to offset rising e-waste recycling costs.**

The State enacted a ban of televisions, computers, monitors, and similar e-waste from landfills in 2010. The program was designed to have shared responsibility from computer and television manufacturers reducing the cost for local governments in recycling the materials. Initially this program was at no cost to local governments, and then it shifted to a fee based model where costs in Vance County alone have gone over \$100,000 per year.

In 2015, the general assembly required a study of electronics recycling by the state department of environmental quality (NCDEQ). The results of that study in 2016 recommended repealing the ban on discarding e-waste in landfills. This is based on EPA's acknowledgement that electronics can be safely disposed of in MSW landfills, the fact that electronics recycling is currently not cost effective, and the fact that electronic wastes constitute such a small percentage (0.2%) of the annual solid waste stream.

4. Education Lottery Funding – Request General Assembly to reinstate education lottery funding back to 40% level.

The use of a flat cap on education funding from the lottery has lessened the overall funding that normally would have come to NC schools had a 40% funding level been maintained.

5. Support efforts to provide greater flexibility to local governments in the expenditure of 911 surcharge funds.

Each year changes to allowable uses of 911 dollars are negatively impacting NC counties. This year alone, changes no longer allowing for reimbursement of 911 GIS positions from 911 funds created a \$55,000 budget impact for Vance County.

6. Oppose any other unfunded mandates and shift of state responsibilities to counties.

Reductions in federal spending and deficits should not be accomplished by shifting costs to counties, imposing unfunded mandates, or pre-empting county programs and taxing authority.

Because Kerr Lake holds the world record for the largest blue catfish ever caught, the collaboration decided that that image was most appropriate to build this festival around. An 8' lighted metal catfish is being created by a local metal artist that will be lowered from a professional crane service at midnight. When not "being caught" on New Year's Eve, the catfish will serve as local artwork to the various state parks in our area.

As with the July 4th Fireworks, VCTDA will obtain all necessary permits and approvals from NC State Parks, the Corp of Engineers, NCDOT, NC Highway Patrol, Vance County Sheriff's Office, the Vance County Fire Chief, and all other numerous other agencies that provide support. As with the July 4th Fireworks, VCTDA will obtain a professional, fully licensed, and insured pyrotechnic company that has provided fireworks to the July 4th Fireworks for over twenty years.



Climate Smart Field Day

On July 9th, The Rodale Institute, in conjunction with several other partners, hosted Climate Smart Field Day at NC A&T University Farm Pavilion in Greensboro, NC. Participants were introduced to regenerative agricultural practices, educated about carbon sequestration, and informed of incentives available to participating farmers.

Almost 200 attendees, including 8 from Vance County (including Michael Ellington, Agriculture Agent and Wayne Rowland, Small Farms Technician), braved the heat to get a peek at some of the latest sustainable agriculture techniques being put into practice. Farmers, XX, and industry professionals gathered for live demonstrations of flail mowers and crimp rollers on actively growing millet followed by an explanation of soil health in the wake of both methods. Afterwards, attendees learned about setup procedures and saw a no-till seed drill in action.

After the field demonstrations, attendees were treated to lunch while a panel with representatives from organizations like USDA and RAFI discussed incentives available for producers and markets. The afternoon was dedicated to symposiums focused on sharing technical knowledge and application of Climate Smart practices.

Agents left with an understanding of the Climate Smart Project's underlying goals and how those goals can benefit local producers and environmental sustainability efforts at large. We're

looking forward to sharing how farmers can possibly reduce costs by implementing sustainable practices while adding value to their finished products with Climate Smart Commodity branding.

Gardening at Turning Point CDC

Wayne Rowland has been teaching a series on Gardening to children at Turning Point, LLC. During this series soil properties were taught, seed identification and how to plant seeds, how to plant transplants in raised beds and containers, and how to care for seedlings and transplants in the garden.

Several in the club have done this to gather Sourwood honey. They shared their experience and what they learned.

Plans have been made for another Honey Extraction at the Vance County Farmers Market on Saturday, August 10 from 4 p.m. until 8 p.m. and Sunday, August 11 from 8 a.m. til 8 p.m.

07/03/24- The March announcement requiring the National Association of Realtors (NAR) to change brokerage fee rules was a result of a legal settlement. This fee change is expected to result in real estate market changes, and before the settlement takes effect, VA pre-emptively announced an update to ensure veterans using the VA-guaranteed home loan benefit remain competitive buyers.

Specifically, eligible veterans, active duty service members and surviving spouses who use their VA home loan benefits can pay for certain real estate buyer-broker fees when buying a home, starting August 10, 2024. The update is meant to ensure VA programs continue promoting access to homeownership for veterans.

07/17/24- The U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs is including three new cancer types in the list of presumed service-connected disabilities due to military environmental exposure under the PACT Act. The announcement marks what the VA describes as continued commitment under the Unity Agenda of the Biden administration and the Biden Cancer Moonshot to support veterans.

Through a sub-regulatory policy letter published to the Federal Register, the following cancer types are now presumptive diseases: male breast cancer, urethral cancer, cancer of the paraurethral glands.

This policy establishes presumptions of service connection for eligible Gulf War and post-9/11 Veterans who deployed to Afghanistan, Somalia, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Yemen, Uzbekistan, and the entire Southwest Asia theater of operations, which includes Iraq. Presumptive service connection means VA automatically assumes service connection for the disease and provides benefits to eligible veterans who have submitted claims with evidence of a diagnosis.



VETERANS SERVICE OFFICE

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07/22/24- Two members of Congress recently introduced a bill that would speed up federal claims for Marines and other service members exposed to toxic chemicals while serving at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

The Camp Lejeune Justice Corrections Act, introduced by Rep. Greg Murphy, R.N.C and Rep. Deborah Ross, D.N.C., dates the previous Camp Lejeune Justice Act, enacted in 2022 as part of the PACT Act.

The updates will clarify plaintiffs have a right to a jury trial, expand jurisdiction to reduce the backlog of cases currently in federal court and cap attorney's fees.
