COUNTY OF VANCE

The Vance County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, September 8, 2015 at 6:00 p.m. in the Commissioners' Conference Room, Vance County Administration Building, 122 Young Street, Henderson, NC. Those Commissioners present were as follows: Chairman Archie B. Taylor, Jr., Commissioners Gordon Wilder, Deborah F. Brown, Dan Brummitt, Terry E. Garrison and Thomas S. Hester, Jr.

Absent: Commissioner Eddie L. Wright.

Also present were Interim County Manager Robert M. Murphy, Deputy County Manager Jordan McMillen, Finance Director David C. Beck, County Attorney Jonathan S. Care, and Clerk to the Board Kelly H. Grissom.

Rev. Todd Stout, Carey Baptist Church, gave the invocation.

The first item on the agenda was public comments. Mr. Edward Spain spoke regarding the proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance in reference to solar farms. He stated that he could support 50 foot setbacks, but could not support 100 foot setbacks. He also stated that single properties in the ETJ that are multi-zoned by the City and the County are a problem.

Ms. Sandra Butler Tubbs spoke about the growing senior population and stated that this is an important issue in Vance County. She stated that seniors need advocacy. She spoke about transportation needs of seniors and stated that KARTS is an option, but can be expensive for those who live out in the county. She also spoke about the cost of tuition at Vance Granville Community College, which can be challenging for seniors who want to further their education. She suggested that the board consider using foreclosed properties throughout the county as possible group homes for seniors.

As advertised, a public hearing was held to consider an amendment to the zoning ordinance to update solar farm regulations. Mr. Jordan McMillen, Deputy County Manager, stated that the amendment as proposed has been reviewed by the Vance County Planning Board on several occasions dating back to December 2014. Recently on July 16, 2015 the Planning Board provided a recommendation supporting the approval of the zoning ordinance amendment concerning solar farms. The amendment as presented includes language updates concerning setbacks, screening and fencing, lighting, glare, annual inspections, and decommissioning of solar farms. As per NC General Statutes and the Vance County Zoning Ordinance, the Planning

Board is required to consider and provide a recommendation on any zoning ordinance amendments. Following the Planning Board recommendation, the Board's Planning and Environmental Committee met on July 22 as directed by the full Board of Commissioners to provide an additional layer of review. During this meeting, the committee was agreeable to all provisions with the exception of setbacks. The recommendation from the Planning Board was for 100 foot setbacks on all sides, and it was felt that this would allow the use of existing foliage when it is available and serve to better reduce the visual impact of solar farms on neighboring properties. The Planning and Environmental Committee felt a compromise of a 100 foot setback on the front with a 50 feet setback on the side was sufficient. Additionally, the Planning and Environmental Committee recommended increasing the fee for solar farm conditional use permits from \$250 to \$400 to accommodate the additional required inspections within the ordinance amendment.

The following options were presented to the board for consideration:

- 100 foot setback on all sides Planning Board recommendation
- 100 foot setback on the front and 50 foot setback on the sides and rear Planning and Environmental Committee Recommendation
- Existing setbacks 50 feet on the front, 25 on the side, and 35 on the rear within AR zoning areas.

Recommendation: Approve zoning ordinance amendment providing additional protections for solar farms inclusive of a 100 foot front setback and 50 foot side and rear setbacks.

Recommendation: Update the Planning and Development Department fee schedule increasing the conditional use permit fee from \$250 to \$400 for solar farms only.

As there was no one present who wished to speak on this matter, Chairman Archie B. Taylor, Jr. declared the public hearing closed.

Motion was made by Commissioner Gordon Wilder to follow the recommendation of the Planning and Environmental Committee and approve a 100 foot setback on the front and 50 foot setback on the sides and rear of solar farm sites. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Deborah F. Brown.

Commissioner Dan Brummitt stated that each solar site is different. A 100 foot setback may work on one site, but not be suitable for another site. Also, how will a 50 foot setback affect the placement of buffers. He feels that these issues need to be addressed, and the ordinance is not yet ready. He cannot support the amendment in its current state.

Vote on the motion to approve a 100 foot setback on the front and 50 foot setback on the sides and rear of solar farm sites was ayes - five (5); noes - one (1), with the dissenting vote being cast by Commissioner Dan Brummitt.

Motion was made by Commissioner Deborah F. Brown, seconded by Commissioner Thomas S. Hester, Jr., vote unanimous, to update the Planning and Development Department fee schedule by increasing the conditional use permit fee from \$250 to \$400 for solar farms only.

Interim County Manager Robert M. Murphy presented an update of the 2015 Summer Work Program as follows:

The Summer Work Program began June 22, 2015 and ended August 14, 2015 with seven students (Northern Vance High School – 2; Southern Vance High School – 2; Western Vance High School – 1; Early College High School – 1; and Vance Granville Community College, IT Dept. – 1). The Program was successful for Vance County and the students. Students gained data entry and web-based research experience, responsibility, and self-confidence while being paid an hourly wage. Departments gained help with research, data entry, and extra hands that allowed regular staff time to work on special projects.

When asked "what was the biggest impact this experience had on them", the students replied in their own words:

- added responsibility
- would like to go to VET School
- patience and stepping outside the box
- being able to work with different people
- the experience of a job
- gained self-confidence
- validating current knowledge and realizing there is still much to learn

Each student would like to see this program continued for rising seniors during the same timeframe.

The Departments benefitting included the Senior Center, Cooperative Extension, Information Technology, Animal Control, and Maintenance.

All Department Supervisors gave high ratings on their evaluations (ranging from a 3 for Average to a 5 for Excellent). Areas that received a 3 included Understanding Broader Issues and Oral and Written Communication, while other areas from Ability to Complete Tasks, Ability to Organize, Making Decisions, Effective Use of Time, and Following Instructions ranked 4's and 5's.

All of the student workers are potentials candidates for hire by their evaluating supervisor. The supervisor would also like to see this program continued yearly. This program was a win-win for everyone.

Dr. Tony Jackson, Vance County Schools Superintendent and Alysa Watkins, Schneider Electric, were next on the agenda seeking support of the Schools' Energy Savings Project. Dr. Jackson stated that the Vance County Board of Education intends to file an application for approval of a guaranteed energy savings performance contract to the North Carolina Local Government Commission (LGC). The purpose of this contract is to reduce energy consumption and improve efficiency throughout the school district. He presented a resolution for the board to consider which is in support of the school district's infrastructure improvements through savings.

The following are the majority of the major Energy Conservation Measures to be implemented through the guaranteed energy savings performance contract.

All schools in the Request for Proposal (RFP)

-interior and exterior LED lighting upgrades

Water Conservation at select sites

Note: Lighting and Water energy conservation measures (ECMs) help fund the other projects listed below.

14 Facilities

- -new web-based/wireless Building Automation System (BAS)
- -this system will tie the existing controls to the new controls in a single window. The foundation will be in place to allow other systems (i.e. security) to be added in the future.

Plug Load Controllers

All schools in the RFP

-building envelope/weatherization

Southern Vance High School

- -replace two chillers
- -variable air volume (VAV) conversion this will improve comfort and increase efficiency at the school

Heat Pump Replacements (per Alysa Watkins, Schneider Electric)

-currently, New Hope is included in the project; however, they are awaiting the interest rate to determine how much of E.M. Rollins can be included in the project. This is why the resolution states a "not to exceed" contract amount.

IT Technology Upgrades

Ms. Watkins discussed the project highlights and stated that this project would save the Schools approximately 30% in utility fees (electric, water and gas).

After brief discussion, motion was made by Commissioner Thomas S. Hester, Jr., seconded by Commissioner Deborah F. Brown, vote unanimous, to approve the following resolution acknowledging the execution and delivery by the Vance County Board of Education of a Guaranteed Energy Savings Contract.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the County of Vance, North Carolina (the "County") as follows:

- 1. The Board hereby finds, determines and acknowledges that:
 - (a) the Vance County Board of Education (the "School Board") plans to enter into an energy savings contract pursuant to G.S. 143-64.17 et. seq. for the purpose of providing certain energy conservation measures authorized thereby (the "Project") so as to reduce energy consumption and/or energy-related operating costs; This project is a fixed priced, turnkey project that is self-performing and will not exceed the amount of \$6.8 million dollars.

- (b) the School Board intends to finance the Project by entering into an installment contract (the "Contract") pursuant to G.S. 143-64.17C and G.S. 160A-20, as amended;
- (c) the energy savings resulting from the Project are expected to equal or exceed the total costs payable under the Contract as shown in an evaluation performed by the engineering firm Advanced Energy on behalf of the School Board;
- (d) the payments under the Contract are not expected to require any additional appropriations to be made to the School Board nor any increase in taxes; and
- (e) the Board does not intend to reduce appropriations to the School Board based upon a reduction of energy costs in a manner that would inhibit the ability of the School Board to make the payments under the Contract, provided that the County is not bound in any manner to appropriate funds to the School Board in amount sufficient for the School Board to make such payments.

Water District Board

At this time, Chairman Archie B. Taylor, Jr. called the Water District Board to order.

Monthly Construction and Operations Reports. Deputy County Manager Jordan McMillen stated that this committee (Garrison [C], Taylor, Brummitt) met Monday, August 31 to review the monthly operational reports as well as to review an extended warranty for the bore at Rock Mill Road and Sandy Creek (Phase 1A), and to provide guidance on the final adjusting change orders for Phase 2A. Staff informed the committee that the greatest priority during the past month has been getting all of the waterlines in the ground to meet the deadline of September 15 imposed by USDA. While this has been a challenging timeline, as of September 3, all of the piping has been installed and testing efforts will be taking place during the next two weeks. Staff informed the committee that significant cleanup is necessary and will be completed over the next few weeks. The staff and crews have been very busy over the last month responding to citizens and addressing the areas in greatest need of cleanup. Regarding the operational reports, a committee member noted the importance of determining methods to recover the availability fees that are greater than 90 days overdue. Staff will be working on another round of the debt setoff

process in the fall and early 2016 in this regard; however, additional methods need to be considered with the assistance of the County Attorney.

Commissioner Deborah F. Brown asked the committee to keep the \$150 deposit and the \$30 monthly base fee in their discussions. She asked when the refund checks would be sent out to residents that signed up for water, but their roads were not included in the water project because of low sign-ups. Deputy County Manager Jordan McMillen stated that refunds will be sent out in batches. They will begin to go out at the end of next week and will continue for five weeks.

Extended Warranty - Rock Mill Road/Sandy Creek Bore. Mr. McMillen reported that the committee met with the contractor (H.G. Reynolds) during its July meeting to discuss contractual matters related to an extended warranty/bond for the Rock Mill Road bore at Sandy Creek. Previously staff has met with the contractor and used direction from the committee in establishing a point for negotiation. During the meeting between the committee and the contractor, the negotiation continued to a point where terms of a three-year extended warranty/bond were agreed upon. The committee feels that a bond is necessary to assist in alleviating concerns following the installation which occurred in September 2013 and subsequent break of the line in March 2014. Following an investigation by the engineer as well as Envirolink, it was determined that the subcontractor attempted to install the bore under the creek as specified, and as a result of encountering rock proceeded to bore the line along an alternative route in the shoulder of the roadway without proper approval of the County, engineer, or the Department of Transportation. Since that time, the engineer, NCDOT, and NCDENR have approved and certified the line in its current location. The committee recommends the extended warranty and bond to close the matter and to allow Phase 1A to close out. Recommendation: Approve warranty bond with H.G. Reynolds providing an extended warranty of three years beyond the standard warranty for the bore located at Rock Mill Road and Sandy Creek.

Motion was made by Commissioner Terry E. Garrison to approve the warranty bond with H.G. Reynolds providing an extended warranty of three years beyond the standard warranty for the bore located at Rock Mill Road and Sandy Creek. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Gordon Wilder and unanimously approved.

Final Adjusting Change Orders – Phase 2A Contract 2. Mr. McMillen stated that the committee reviewed the budgets for Phase 2A and 2B in order to recommend approval of the

final adjusting change order for the remaining contract in Phase 2A. Previously, the board

approved final adjusting change orders for all other contracts within Phase 2A and 2B and has

left the remaining contract open to allow the final road additions to be completed. USDA has

imposed a deadline of September 15 for all work to be complete and will be closing out the

funding by September 30. As a result of this, it is necessary for the board to approve the

remaining adjusting change order. From a review of the budgets, it is anticipated that \$275,000

in Phase 2A and \$859,000 in Phase 2B grant funds will be returned to USDA. The County is in

discussions with USDA and believes they are willing to provide an additional grant of up to \$1

million which would be used to complete Rock Mill Road, NC 39 Hwy South to Foster Road,

and Foster Road in 2016. The committee recommends approval of the final adjusting change

order from Phase 2A, Contract 2. This would be a deducting change order of \$366,142.29 from

the contract. **Recommendation:** Approve final adjusting change order for Contract 2 in Phase

2A with Hawley Construction.

Motion was made by Commissioner Terry E. Garrison, seconded by Commissioner

Gordon Wilder, vote unanimous, to approve the final adjusting change order for Contract 2 in

Phase 2A with Hawley Construction and authorize the Chairman to sign the change order as

necessary.

Commissioner Deborah F. Brown asked the staff and committee to continue to look for

grants and/or other funding to have waterlines installed in the northern part of the county.

Chairman Taylor and Commissioner Garrison stated that water needs to be made available to all

county residents if possible.

At this time, Chairman Archie B. Taylor, Jr. closed the Water District Board.

Committee Reports and Recommendations

Human Resources Committee - Position Vacancies. Commissioner Deborah F. Brown,

Chairperson of the Human Resources Committee, stated that the committee endorses filling the

following positions and requests approval by the full board:

Deputy Sheriff - three positions

Motion was made by Commissioner Deborah F. Brown, seconded by Commissioner Gordon Wilder, vote unanimous, to approve filling the position vacancies as requested.

Commissioner Deborah F. Brown stated that the Committee discussed authorizing the staff to fill routine position vacancies (that have already been approved during the previous budget process) instead of going through the Human Resources Committee. The Board would still like to receive a monthly report on positions filled.

After brief discussion, motion was made by Commissioner Deborah F. Brown, seconded by Commissioner Terry E. Garrison, vote unanimous, to authorize staff to fill routine position vacancies that have already been approved during the budget process.

Public Safety Committee - Review of Animal Shelter Plans and Timeline. The committee (Brummitt [C], Brown, & Wilder) met Wednesday, August 19 to review the final building and site plans for the animal shelter prior to submitting to USDA for authorization to bid the project. The committee was made aware that a sewer pump system will be necessary to pump from the Brodie Road side of the property to the Julia Avenue side of the property due to elevations. Staff has followed up with the City of Henderson and it is apparent that a small pump system is necessary. While not anticipated originally, it is believed that this can be covered within the existing USDA project budget. The project architect will be releasing the project for bids as soon as authorization is received from USDA. The updated budget projections and timeline were provided to the Board for information.

Tax Revaluation Ad-Hoc Committee - Revaluation Timeline and Public Education Update. The committee (Brummitt [C], Garrison & Brown) met Monday, August 31 to review the revaluation timeline and to receive an update on public education efforts. The Tax Administrator informed the committee that informational letters were included in the recent mailing of annual bills, a Q&A has been added to the County website, and an informational brochure will be distributed at various locations during the month of October. A copy of the timeline inclusive of planned educational efforts was provided to the Board. The committee discussed the appeal process which will take place between February and April 2016 and discussed the importance and timing for communicating the concept of revenue-neutral. The

committee felt that the ideal time to provide information on revenue-neutral would be to include information with the assessment letters to be mailed out in February 2016.

Properties Committee - Offers to Purchase REO Properties. Commissioner Deborah F. Brown stated that the committee (Brown [C], Brummitt & Hester) met Tuesday, September 1 and reviewed three offers to purchase property owned by the County and one offer to purchase property owned jointly by the City and County as a result of foreclosure. The offers were as follows:

- ➤ NC Hwy 39 North (Tax Parcel 0365 02045) \$1,500 (County Owned)
- ➤ Woodsworth Road (Tax Parcel 0303 02005) \$1,500 (County Owned)
- Orr's Lane (Tax Parcel 0404 03025) \$1,100 (County Owned)
- ➤ 152 South Bullock Street (Tax Parcel 0085 01011) \$750 (City/County Owned)

Following a review of the offers, the committee recommended proceeding with the upset bid process for the first property located off of NC Hwy 39 North. It is hoped that opening this property up with an access road may lead to other property development in the area. In addition, the committee established counter offers for the Woodsworth Road and South Bullock Street properties that would cover the County costs and uncollected taxes for the properties. The committee did not provide a counter offer for the Orr Lane property and believes another pending foreclosure in the immediate area could be combined with this land and draw more attractive offers in the future. **Recommendation:** Approve resolution authorizing the upset bid process for the sale of tax parcel 0365 02045 located off of NC Hwy 39 North.

Motion was made by Commissioner Deborah F. Brown, seconded by Commissioner Gordon Wilder, vote unanimous, to approve the following resolution authorizing the upset bid process for the sale of tax parcel 0365 02045 located off of NC Hwy 39 North.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING UPSET BID PROCESS FOR SALE OF REAL PROPERTY NC Hwy 39 North, Henderson, NC 27537

WHEREAS, Vance County owns certain real property with an address of NC Hwy 39 North, Henderson, North Carolina, and more particularly described by the Vance County Tax Department as Parcel Number 0365 02045; and,

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute §160A-269 permits the county to sell real property by upset bid, after receipt of an offer for the property; and,

WHEREAS, the County has received an offer to purchase the real property described herein above in the amount of \$1,500.00 subject to the terms and conditions as included in the submitted offer to purchase bid, submitted by *Mekre Eyesus Francis*; and,

WHEREAS, *Mekre Eyesus Francis* has paid the required deposit in the amount of \$1,500.00 with his offer.

THEREFORE, THE VANCE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS RESOLVES THAT:

- 1. The Board of County Commissioners declares the real property described above surplus and authorizes its sale through the upset bid procedure of North Carolina General Statute §160A-269.
- 2. A notice of the proposed sale shall be published which shall describe the property and the amount of the offer and shall require any upset offer be subject to the same terms and conditions as contained therein except for the purchase price.
- 3. Any person may submit an upset bid to the Clerk to the Board of County Commissioners within 10 days after the notice of sale is published. Once a qualifying higher bid has been received, that bid will become the new offer.
- 4. If a qualifying upset bid is received, a new notice of upset bid shall be published, and shall continue to do so until a 10-day period has passed without any qualifying upset bid having been received. At that time, the amount of the final high bid shall be reported to the Board of County Commissioners.
- 5. A qualifying higher bid is one that raises the existing offer by the greater of \$750 or ten percent (10%) of the first \$1,000.00 of that offer and five percent (5%) of the remainder of the offer and is subject to the same terms and conditions of the previous bid.
- 6. A qualifying higher bid must also be accompanied by a deposit in the amount of the greater of \$750 or five percent (5%) of the bid, which may be made by cash, cashier's check or certified funds. The County will return the deposit of any bid not accepted and will return the bid of an offer subject to upset if a qualifying higher bid is received.
- 7. The terms of the final sale are that the Board of County Commissioners must approve the final high offer before the sale is closed and the buyer must pay with certified funds or wire transfer the bid amount and any other amounts as required pursuant to the terms and conditions of the bid at the time of closing, which shall be no later than 30 days following the approval by this Board of the final bid. The real property is sold in its current condition, as is, and the County gives no warranty with respect to the usability of the real property or title. Title will be delivered at closing by a Non Warranty Deed, subject to exceptions for ad valorem taxes, assessments, zoning regulations, restrictive covenants, street easements, rights of others in possession and any other encumbrances of record. Buyer shall pay for preparation and recording of the Deed and revenue stamps.
- 8. The County reserves the right to withdraw the property from sale at any time before the final high bid is accepted **and the right to reject all bids at any time**.
- 9. If no qualifying upset bid is received, the Board of County Commissioners will accept or reject the bid submitted within 60 days after the close of the 10-day upset period.

Update - Building Needs Assessment and Space Study. Staff informed the committee that they have reached out to other architects and are awaiting their proposals. Once received, the committee will review and advise the full Board on the best way to proceed.

Demolition of REO Properties. The committee reviewed the listing of County REO properties and focused their discussion on 11 properties with structures in need of demolition. Staff has applied for grant funding from the State's abandoned mobile home program and believes that six of the 11 properties can be handled at minimal cost with those funds. Regarding the remaining six properties, it is anticipated that demolition could cost approximately \$17,500. The majority of committee members would like to take a phased approach utilizing the existing budgeted funds this year to carry out the abandoned mobile home program and to demolish one other structure. The committee will then revisit the other properties later in the fiscal year when better revenue projections are available. The committee prioritized one property for immediate demolition (1335 Epsom Road) due to its location near the new charter school and also as a result of the potential for drawing unwanted activity to the property. Staff will be proceeding with the solicitation of quotes for the demolition of this structure.

Marketing of REO Properties. The committee discussed marketing strategies for the remaining County REO properties and was made aware that staff is working to list the properties on the County website. The committee discussed the potential for listing the properties on GovDeals which is an internet auction site used by many counties throughout North Carolina to dispose of surplus property and real estate property. The committee believes this is a viable option for marketing the properties and will be receiving additional information from GovDeals in the coming weeks. Additionally, staff and the committee discussed the need for establishing a minimum bid amount for each property prior to listing the properties and will send letters to surrounding property owners once a minimum bid amount is established by the committee.

Finance Director's Report

Surplus Equipment. Finance Director David C. Beck presented the following item to be declared as surplus:

Mr. Beck stated that a couple of private EMS agencies have expressed interest in purchasing the unit. Any offers received will be brought to the full board for consideration.

Motion was made by Commissioner Dan Brummitt to declare the 2007 Ford E-450 Ambulance as surplus and authorize the Finance Director to dispose of the equipment. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Gordon Wilder and unanimously approved.

Autopulse Boards for EMS Units. Mr. Beck stated that Vance County EMS has an opportunity to purchase three Autopulse boards at a deeply discounted rate. These units typically cost between \$15,000 and \$18,000, and we have an offer from a vendor to purchase three demo units at a cost of \$8,500 each. The vendor is working to secure a fourth board at a comparable price so that all of our EMS units will be outfitted equally. Autopulse boards are used to deliver chest compressions to a patient during a cardiac event. The boards deliver a more consistent compression rate than when performed by a medic. Use of the board also frees up the medic to administer other care while the machine delivers chest compressions to the patient. Recommendation: Approve budget amendment allocating \$34,500 for the purchase of four Autopulse boards to outfit all Vance County EMS units.

After a brief question and answer discussion, motion was made by Commissioner Gordon Wilder, seconded by Commissioner Dan Brummitt, vote unanimous, to approve Budget Amendment #5 allocating \$34,500 for the purchase of four Autopulse boards to outfit all Vance County EMS units.

County Attorney's Report
